PREPARING FOR THE AKT

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WHY AM I TALKING TO YOU ABOUT THE AKT?

- > 20-25 trainees in our Deanery fail each exam
- Two thirds have failed on their first attempt

AVOIDABLE

AKT 1:1

- Every trainee who fails the AKT is offered a 1:1 meeting
- For the past 2 years these have been mostly with me
- Recently appointed exam support lead- Dr Salman Waqar
- What I do...
 - Coaching approach
 - Explore preparation for previous exam
 - Plan preparation for next attempt
 - Consider need for additional support
- What I've learned...
 - Common themes for why trainees fail
 - Most are avoidable
 - Trainers don't realise the impact they can have in helping their trainees to prepare for the AKT

WHY DO TRAINEES FAIL?

- Underestimate the challenge- especially if already done e.g. MRCP
- Take it too early in their training
- Start preparing too late- need at least 3 months- longer if busy home life
- Unfocussed approach
- Under-utilisation of available resources
- Over-reliance on question banks
- Poor exam technique
- Undiagnosed dyslexia

<u>Un</u>avoidable events- MINORITY

ABOUT THE EXAM

- APPLIED Knowledge Test
- > 3 sittings per year- January, April & October and from 2024 a 4th in July
- Pearson Vue Centre-watch the video
- 200 questions in 190 min (57s/question)
- SBA/EMQ/free text questions
- No negative marking
- Option to flag
- Pass rate in April 2023 was 68%

WHEN TO TAKE IT

- Discuss readiness with your Trainer
- Not before the second half of ST2
- After at least 6 months of GP
- When there is time to study in the 3 months leading up to it
- > Avoid taking it after a period of absence e.g. mat leave
- More trainees taking it in ST3 which adds to an already busy year

HOW TO PREPARE

allow sufficient time & use available resources

- Start preparing at least 3 months before the exam

- Subscribe to a question bank and/or use GPSelfTest

- Join a study group

IDENTIFY LEARNING NEEDS

Focussed revision

- Prior clinical experience
- Seeing patients (PUNs & DENs)
- Ask your Trainer
- Curriculum guide <u>https://www.rcgp.org.uk/mrcgp-exams/gp-curriculum/super-condensed-guides</u>
- Question banks

HIGH YIELD TOPICS Focussed revision

- Organisational including administrative, statutory, ethical and regulatory frameworks (10%)
- Evidence interpretation including research, statistics and epidemiology (10%) <u>Clinical evidence and data interpretation: 'Statistics' in the AKT (PDF file, 1.6 MB)</u>
- Clinical 80%
- Therapeutics (30%) first few chapters of BNF; common & important contraindications, side effects and interactions of medications
- THE 5 YEAR AKT FEEDBACK SUMMARY October 2018 to April 2023 feedback report (PDF file, 148 KB)

PLAN YOUR STUDY

Focussed revision

- Daily questions (40%)
- Protected blocks of study time in the week to address learning needs (60%)
- ▶ Weekly timed questions- practice recall under pressure & exam technique
- ► Regular questions with Trainer
- Regular sessions with Study Group
- Keep a list of learning needs
- Keep notes on weaker areas
- Revise your notes
- Practice recall DO NOT rely on question banks to practice recall

- > You need to be in good shape to perform well on the day

A post-exam questionnaire answered by 800/1050 AITs sitting their AKT in April 2017 highlighted that a large majority (85%) did not feel their Trainer helped them with AKT preparation.

This confirms a commonly held belief amongst many GP Educators we have spoken to, encapsulated by such phrases as:

• "But I'm a Trainer, what can I do to help my AiT succeed at their AKT exam?"

• "I'm not sure I have anything to offer my AiT with regards the AKT"

• "In order to pass the AKT requires an AiT to read books in their own time"

How can you help your trainee to pass?

As ES initiate discussion with your trainee early on:

- ▶ When to take the AKT not before 2nd half ST2 ideally in a GP placement
- check readiness with CS BEFORE booking exam
- allow at least 3 months to prepare
- Join a study group- speak to PDs
- read the RCGP website AKT section especially:
 - https://www.rcgp.org.uk/mrcgp-exams/applied-knowledge-test
 - October 2018 to April 2023 feedback report (PDF file, 148 KB)
- Attend the 3 Deanery courses-they will receive emails with dates
- Avoid over-reliance on question banks
- Practice timed questions
- As CS in ST2 discuss the above and
 - assess readiness by doing questions with your trainee
 - Tutorials

Tutorials for the AKT

- Do questions together thinking like a GP + assessing readiness
- File blood test results
- Also ECGs, spirometry, audiograms-geeky medics
- Sign prescriptions-discuss common indications/ side effects/ interactions
- Also medicines monitoring <u>https://www.sps.nhs.uk/home/tools/drug-monitoring/</u>
- Look at photos of eyes, ears, skin-geeky medics/ pcds/ dermnz
- Look at the 5 year AKT feedback summary together
- Focus on learning needs e.g. neurology/ ophthalmology- ask your trainee
- Signpost & discuss resources you use e.g. UKMEC / DSFRH / fitness to fly / DVLA / BASSH / notifiable diseases / school exclusion for infections etc.
