Welcome to all our trainers and especially to any new trainers for whom this is their first time attending.


This is the second of our faculty days, our spring faculty day being normally virtual.

IMG

- The UK medical workforce headcount is growing, with large increases in international medical graduates (IMGs) whose primary medical qualification (PMQ) is from outside the UK and European Economic Area (EEA).
- The number of IMGs has increased by 40% in the last fve years at a time when the number of UK graduates in the workforce increased by 10%
- Of the doctors who joined the workforce in 2021, half (50%) were IMGs and 39%

were UK graduates.

• The workforce will grow by a third by 2030 compared to 2021 if current trends

continue. However, if the rate of IMGs joining goes back to pre-2017 levels, there

will be 23,000 fewer doctors in 2030. This highlights the importance of IMGs to the

UK workforce.
